

THE PRESIDENTS CORNER

Some of you may be surprised, but the Guild is not a perfect organization. Remember the famous saying of Yogi Berra, "If America was perfect, it wouldn't be." So is the state of our beloved Woodworkers Guild. We have now been organized and have continuously operated for 35 years. Since 1981 hundreds of people with all kinds of backgrounds have contributed to what we are today, and they got most things right! As in all things, some members want to go in one direction, others in the opposite direction. Some want short, entertaining meetings; others want detailed presentations; and still others prefer no meetings at all! About 200 of our approximately 700 members never sign-in to the shop during the year, while about 100 sign-in at least three times per month. We average about 150 members at each meeting, but most of our members seldom if ever attend a meeting. So, what can we do to seek perfection? What can we do to satisfy all members? Is it our mission to be perfect, with totally satisfied members? Even if we tried, we still wouldn't get it right for everyone. That is why communica-

tions and feedback is so vital. We want to offer programs and opportunities that some members will enjoy, knowing that others won't participate. The recent Road Trip to the Museum of Early Southern Decorative Arts is an example. Only thirteen members and their spouses took advantage and went on the trip, but for some of them it was a significant benefit, and one of the few opportunities for them to participate. The Guild offers dozens of different classes, project activities, different wood species, and the list goes on and on. In essence, we try to offer something, if only one thing, that each individual member can participate in. Therefore, let us resolve to openly communicate our ideas, and share your thoughts about what the Guild does or does not offer you. Only by hearing what members want, and are willing to participate in, can your leadership team develop the tools to do a better job for you. It won't be perfect, but we can all try to do one thing better each day.

Our library is one of the features that sets our Guild apart from most other non-profit organizations. When speakers, presenters, prospective donors or likely new members see our library they are visually impressed by not only the physical assets, but the fact that the Woodworkers Guild is serious about research, history and preservation of the woodworking

trade. We have an extensive collection of magazines, how-to books, plans, videos, etc. that benefit all members, new and old. Cities, states and universities, and now Guilds, are often noted for their library facilities.

A significant feature of our library is the ability to quickly find articles, plans and descriptions of any woodworking project you desire. Simply go to the computer in the library, follow the instructions posted there and enter your description, i.e. “end table”. It will list all magazines, articles, and the page or issue that “end table” appears in. You can then go to the shelf and pull that issue. This takes less than a minute! Or, you are free to pull magazines and browse to your heart’s content. But please, **DO NOT REMOVE** magazines or books from the library. They have been painstakingly catalogued and provided for everyone to use, so please put them back exactly where you got them. Most magazines allow copying

for personal use, and a copy machine is available in the adjacent work room. Also, check-out for videos and other library material will be available at monthly meetings.

Got old magazine copies you wish to donate? We probably already have those copies! We have complete sets of “Woodsmith”, “Fine Woodworking” and possibly other magazines. We do need hard-back books since this collection is minimal. If you wish to donate books or magazines, e-mail pres@greenvillewoodworkers.com and we will assist you. Excess copies will be offered to members at monthly meetings.


